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TRADITIONAL MEETS MODERN AS TUMU STUDIO CRAFTS A STYLISH SANCTUARY FOR A HIGH-POWERED PROFESSIONAL COUPLE AND THEIR CHILDREN.

THE CLIENTS

The Lincoln Park power couple he in finance, she an entrepreneur in the thick of launching her own business—hit it off with Tumu Studio founder, architect and interior designer Huili Feng over coffee on a frigid winter day. Shortly thereafter, the project took shape: transforming their heretofore uninspiring house into a stylish, unfussy sanctuary that would enable them to retreat from the frenetic pace of their professional lives.

THE PRIORITY

To create an elegant, sophisticated and open living space that would be a warm, cozy and kid-friendly place to raise their two energetic, imaginative boys—but also serve as an effective launchpad office for the wife's burgeoning company.

THE CHALLENGE

"As a design team," notes Feng, "we're known for our modern and minimalist aesthetic; our clients' taste is more transitional. Creatively, we were excited by the primary overall challenge of embracing traditional elements in our more modern design to ensure that we were effectively creating a timeless forever home that would be effortlessly chic: comfortable, styled in their taste, and that would function for their family." Another challenge,



Feng says? To transform a long, narrow, open living space into four different functional areas: an entryway-lounge area, a main living space, a formal dining space and a kitchen. "The goal was to give each space its own character without feeling disjointed."

THE STRATEGY

Curation was key, reports Feng. "To achieve a cohesive palette, we had to carefully curate each furniture piece and design each detail for the right balance of traditional and modern aesthetic. To define the functional space, we added an arched doorway to distinguish the formal dining area from the kitchen, and a custom millwork entry piece to separate the entry from the living space." A wall paneling pattern that runs throughout the space also creates cohesion and serves as a backdrop for art and furniture, and a darker wood stain for all the custom millwork throughout the house achieves a timeless look.





THE DETAIL

Art pieces sourced with neighbor and gallery owner Carrie Secrist add a whimsical touch throughout; and a custom-made cabinet anchors the main living spaceand proved the perfect compromise for a marital sticking point. "The husband wanted a TV in the living room but the wife didn't," explains Feng, whose team responded with a stunning piece that anchors the room and doubles as a mantel, "and when it's game or movie time, the doors slide open to reveal a television."

THE OUTCOME

The owners are over the moon, noting, "We liked transitionalstyle homes. Our designer pushed us to the more modern end of the transitional spectrum, and we love how it turned out."
